

M. .The meet is open only to Town of Amherst residents and will include 18 races for boys and 11 races for girls under 21. Contestants are requested to read the rules carefully. Those who wish to swim together on a relay team should either submit their entries together, or enclose an extra sheet of paper listing the team. Anyone who wants to enter the relay event, and does not have a team, may simply note that fact and the director will help organize extra teams.

In an effort to provide top competition for the swimmers of the town, and to eliminate these swimmers from the regular classes, Director Herbert J. Mols announces the addition of a new senior class this year. Any swimmer who has won an interscholastic, intercollegiate freshman or varsity, or AAU race must automatically enter this class. It is hoped that this will encourage others to enter the other age classes.

In order to provide added incentive to the senior class, service organiza-tions of the town have responded to the appeal and are sponsoring the various events of the class.
