Red Sox Win Connie Mack Championship

Bobby Stone's sharp single to center in the 10th inning gave the Red Sox a 10-9 play-off win over the Tigers and secured the Connie Mack Little League championship for the Sox, who took the first game of the best-of-three play-off series, 2-1.

Tom Ansuini, the leading hitter in the series with five hits in seven at-bats, scored the first Red Sox run in the opener and drove in the clincher in the sixth. Henry Degener and Billy Nelson divided the pitching for the Sox and limited the Tigers to one hit, a single by Tom Sinclair.

Sox Score Eight in Third

Orrie Lowe went the route for the Tigers in the opener, giving up six hits, fanning six, and walking two. Degener and Nelson struck out seven and walked three.

The Red Sox countered eight times in the third inning of the second game to offset a 3-0 Tiger advantage. Lowe socked a two-run homer for the Bengals in the first. The Tigers bounced back in the fifth with four runs to knot the count at 8-8.

Both clubs traded seventh-inning tallies before Stone delivered his game-winning hit in the 10th. Bobby Kish and Ansuini each collected three hits for the Red Sox who, by winning the series, annexed both the first- and second-half championships.

Town Champs Win 15 of 16

Central Amherst Wins LL Crown

Central Amherst Little League's pennant-winning Braves gained the unofficial town championship by defeating teams representing Joe McCarthy, Connie Mack and Mel Ott Little Leagues. Central Amherst won 15 of the 16 games played with teams of corresponding positions from the other three leagues.

The Braves opened with a 4-2 win over the White Sox of the Joe McCarthy circuit. Peewee Delcour made his pitching debut and backed by the Braves' tight defense limited the Sox to one hit.

The Braves made it two straight with a 7-6 win over the Connie Mack Red Sox.

Steve Robida's three-run home run in the fourth was the key blow after Tom Teach had delivered a clutch single in the second when the Braves rebounded from a 4-0 deficit with a three-run splurge.
