Williamsville High School will play host to the AAU Olympic Development Track and Field Program on Aug. 10, when the second meet of the twilight series will be held at 5:30. The first meet was held yesterday, Aug. 3, at Kenmore Senior High; the third meet will be held Wednesday, Aug. 17, at the Park School on Harlem Road in Snyder, starting at 6 P. M.

These events will be run off at Williamsville on Wednesday, Aug. 17: 200 meters run, 800 meters run, 5000 meters run, 3000 meters walk, 110 meters high hurdles, broad jump, pole vault, javelin, 16 lb. hammer throw, women's 80 meters hurdles, and women's broad jump.

In addition, three events of the Decathlon will be held: the 100 meters run, the 110 meters high hurdles and the 16 lb. shot put.

At the Park School, four events of the Decathlon will be held: the javelin throw, high jump, discus throw and 1500 meters run. In addition the 3000 meter steeplechase will be run off.

Events at Kenmore yesterday included runs of 100, 400 and 1500 meters, the 400 meters low hurdles, the high jump and the women's 100 meters and high jump. As part of the Decathlon, the broad jump, pole vault and

The heats are con-ducted on a time trial basis, with eight fastest qualifying for the semi-finals. The top four are de-cided by the results of the semifinal heats so that Friday night presents a complete finals affair.
