

PARK LOSES HUFFORD FOR PEBBLE GAME

Jim Hufford, Park School's all-league quarterback in the Conference of Upstate Private Schools' Six-Man Football League, will be unable to play when Park entertains Pebble Hill School of Syracuse at Snyder tomorrow at 11 A. M. Hufford is lost for the season because of ailing legs. Park's sixers will be seeking their fifth straight win and their 14th in a row since last year.

PARK'S 6-MAN TEAM AGAIN WINS CROWN

Park School of Buffalo won the Conference of Upstate Private Schools six-man football championship for the third year Saturday afternoon when it defeated Pebble Hill of Syracuse, 31 to 12, at Snyder. In soccer, Park's varsity was defeated by Gow of South Wales, 1 to 0, while Park's middle school team edged Gow 1 to 4, on Bob Wilson's goal. In girls' field hockey, Park's undefeated team played a 2-to-2 tie with Haverkil College at Toronto.

In six-man football, in which Park scored its 15th consecutive win over three seasons, Dick Carl and Bill Bridge each scored two touchdowns and Pete Dow one on a 60-yard pass-play from Terry Check. Check passed to Seth Bridge for the point.

Park Gymkhana Is Saturday

Park Gridders Win CUPS Title

Unbeaten Park School successfully retained its Conference of Upstate Private Schools six-man football title yesterday afternoon by defeating Lakemont Academy, 46-18. Terry Check passed for four touchdowns and scored two himself. It was Park's seventh victory of the season and 17th game undefeated over a three-year span.

Check passed 30 yards to Dick Carl for the initial TD. Check returned a kickoff 70 yards for the following score and passed to Pete Dow, 30 and 67 yards for the other first period six-pointers. Carl snared a Lakemont pass and raced 20 yards for the next score in the second period. Check scampered 30 yards for a touchdown in the last period and passed to Seth Bridge, who lateraled to Gayl Cummins for the final TD.

Park's soccer team lost to Lakemont, 3-1, while the girls' field hockey team won their 14th game of the season defeating the Buffalo Field Hockey Club, 2-0, and Haverkil College of Toronto, 2-0, in a round robin series.

Terry Check returned a kick 70 yards for a touchdown and passed 48 and 35 yards to Pete Dow for two others to pace Park School of Buffalo's undefeated six-man football team to a 28-to-14 win over Ellicottville at Snyder Saturday afternoon.
