Lakemont, Oct. 13—Park School's smooth-operating football forces carved out their 27th consecutive six-man football victory today by edging Lakemont Academy, 24-18, in a Conference of Upstate Private Schools game.

Joe Scandura hit pay dirt twice for Park on runs of 17 and 25 yards. Dale Casto scored on a six-yard end run and Ray Sendker racked up a touchdown by recovering a fumble in the Lakemont end zone.

Jerry Ames tossed two touchdown passes to Bob Dahlgren for Lakemont. Ronnie Gundry accounted for the other TD by racing 50 yards with a punt.

PARK SCHOOL WINS 27TH IN ROW, DOWNS LAKEMONT, 24 TO 18

LAKEMONT, Oct. 15.—Lakemont Academy's grid team threw a scare into Park School Saturday, but the latter finally emerged victorious, 24 to 18, here in a Conference of Upstate Private Schools six-man game. It was the 27th straight win for Park over a three-year span.

Runs of 18 yards by Dale Casto and 25 yards by Joe Scandura set up the former's 6-yard touchdown dash in the second quarter. Later in the quarter, Scandura ran 15 yards for Park's second tally.

Ray Sendker blocked a Lakemont punt in the end zone for a third-quarter touchdown and in the fourth quarter, Sendker recovered a Lakemont fumble which was converted four plays later into a touchdown by Scandura on a 17-yard run. Jerry Ames threw two touchdown passes to Bob Dahlgren and Ron Gundry returned a kickoff 60 yards for Lakemont's final score.

The Lakemont soccer team blanked the Park booters, 5 to 0, in a CUPS game.

OLV Cracks Park's Win Streak, 13-12

Our Lady of Victory's six-man football team snapped the Park School's 27-game winning streak last night by punching across a touchdown in the final 30 seconds for a 13-12 victory at Lackawanna Stadium. It was the second win in three starts for Coach Dick Proznick's OLV charges.

Norm Evancho scored both OLV touchdowns. He hit paydirt early in the third period on a 48-yard gallop around left end. Jack Haggerty passed to Dick Corcoran for the extra point, which eventually was to decide the hard fought contest.

Park clicked for two quick TDs in the fourth period to take a 12-7 command. Joe Scandura accounted for both scores on a six-yard end run and a 45-yard pass from Bud Gross. With 2:10 left, OLV drove 76 yards for the winning TD with Haggerty flinging five straight completed passes. Evancho caught a short toss over center and scampered 15 yards for the six-pointer.

PARK'S WIN STREAK SNAPPED AT 27 AS OLV SCORES, 13-12

Paced by hard-running Norm Evancho who scored both touchdowns and was a standout defensively, Our Lady of Victory Academy's six-man grid team Saturday night shattered Park School's 27-game victory string, winning, 13 to 12, in Lackawanna Civic Stadium.

Evancho scored the winning touchdown on a 15-yard pass from Jack Haggerty with 8 seconds left in the game. He also scored in the third quarter on a 48-yard run. Haggerty passed to Dick Corcoran for what proved to be the game-deciding point.

Joe Scandura tallied twice for Park in the fourth quarter, the first time on a six-yard end run and the second on a 45-yard pass from Len Gross. Park led in first downs, 10 to 4, and in total offense, 260 to 187 yards, and had two touchdowns called back because of penalties.

Park Scores 27th Grid Win

Trims Lakemont 20-19 — "Our Lady of Victory Is Next

Park School's six-man football team visited Lakemont Academy last Saturday morning and after their toughest test in 2 years, emerged with a 24-18 win over their CUPS rivals. Park's last loss had occurred 4 years ago at this same field when Lakemont came through in the last few minutes to win 20-19. For most of the last period Saturday, Lakemont threatened to duplicate that feat. But the Pioneers managed to come back after each threat and the game ended with Park still in possession, and moving toward the goal line, 15 yards away.

Lakemont received the opening kickoff and marched all the way to Park's 10 before they were stopped. The line play of this Park line, led by game co-captains Ray Sendker and Lenny Gross and the other end, Harold Ruslander, told in this first drive, and continued to show during the entire game. They opened holes on offense, and at the beginning of the 2nd period, a sustained drive of 50 yards ended with Dale Casto plunging for the final 6 yards. Shortly thereafter, a recovered fumble and a 25-yard run by Joe Scandura reached pay dirt. The half ended with Park ahead 12-0.

Lakemont opened the 2nd half with a drive of their own culminating in a 25-yard pass play from Jerry Ames to Bob Dahlgren for a score. Park drove again but lost the ball on downs. They kept Lakemont hemmed in near their goal line and when they attempted to kick out, Ray Sendker blocked the kick and recovered the ball in the end zone for a TD. The ensuing kickoff was taken by Lakemont's Ronnie Gundry all the way for a TD. In the last period, Joe Scandura ran 17 yards for another Park score when another Ames to Dahlgren pass play clicked for 10 and Lakemont's last score. This was Park's 3rd win of the year, all in CUPS competition, and the 27th in a row since 1947.

The soccer team accompanied the football team and met stiffer competition ending up on the short end of a 5-0 score. The home team sported a couple of Chinese brothers, Leong and Juan Tan, who led the offense with 3 goals while two South Americans, Mario DeBout and Roberto Medino chimed in with 2 other goals. Lakemont thus stepped into the CUPS soccer lead for the Beck's trophy.

This week finds the teams returning home, as Allendale is entertained Saturday at 2 in a CUPS soccer game, while the football team plays in its 2nd night game in history by playing Our Lady of Victory at Lackawanna Stadium, Saturday night; kickoff at 8 P. M. This is a non-league game.

Park School Football Winning Streak Stopped

Last Saturday, in a night game at Lackawanna Stadium, Park School suffered its first football loss since Oct. 18, 1947, when a scrappy Our Lady of Victory six came from behind to emerge the winner on the margin of a point after touchdown pass, 13-12. The Park School loss in 1947 was also by 1 point, 20-19. The loss thus ended a winning streak which had reached 27 games. This was not a Conference of Upstate Private Schools game, so that Park continues as the leader in that loop, undefeated in 3 games.

The low scoring in the game was evidence of the evenness of the two teams as well as the fine line play of both teams.

PARK'S 6-MAN TEAM RALLIES IN SECOND, EDGES ARCADE, 27-20

Scoring three times in the second quarter, Park School's six-man football team Friday edged Arcade, 27 to 20, in a nonleague game at Park.

Dale Casto's one-yard plunge culminated a 46-yard drive for Park's first tally and Casto passed to Joe Scandura for the extra point. Scandura scored on a 45-yard run, after which Casto dropkicked for two points and later, Tom Zierk tossed a 20-yard touchdown pass to Len Gross.

Len Liotti climaxed a 54-yard Park march, scoring from the six-yard line in the final quarter.

Dave Owens was the Arcade star. He passed 19 yards to Dave Bantle in the first quarter for a touchdown and raced 55 yards for another tally in the third quarter. Then in the fourth quarter he returned a kickoff 65 yards for another touchdown.

In soccer, John Clark accounted for the only goal in Park's 3-to-1 loss at Harley in a Conference of Upstate Private Schools game.
