

## Six Park School Players Named To All-Star Squads

The Park School received two berths of the football squad and four on the soccer squad of the annual All-Conference of Upstate Private Schools Teams, which were announced last night.

Selection of the teams is made by the players of each school in the league. Announcement was made by Kenneth Anthony of DeVeaux School, Niagara Falls, the fall sports chairman.

Park School went unbeaten in four league games to win the six-man football championship and the Syracuse Alumni Cup. The Park soccer team won the league championship and the German AC Cup in soccer with a record of four wins, no losses and two ties.

## PARK TEAMS CLOSE SEASON WITH VICTORIES

Park School's soccer and football teams closed out their most successful combined season with victories over the past week end. Each team sported a record which showed only one loss; the soccer team winning 5 and tying 2, while the footballers won 6.

On Friday the soccer team visited Gow School of South Wales and gained a non-league 5-0 shut-out over their hosts. After a scoreless first period, Larry Bodden broke the ice with a penalty shot. He followed up a rebound shortly thereafter with another goal after which Co-captain Bob Wilson fired one from outside the penalty area. In the third period, Co-captain Dave Stewart countered while high scorer for the year, John Clark, closed out the scoring in the final period. Clark had 8 goals for the season followed by Wilson with 5 and Larry Bodden with 4.

The football team journeyed to Syracuse to drop Pebble Hill, 33-19, and keep its CUPS record unblemished and to gain the Yale trophy for the 3rd time and thereby earned permanent possession. Co-captains Dave Lyon and John Reissig led their teammates to a comeback win.

Seniors Lyon and Bell led the season scoring with 43 and 42 points respectively. Bell made his career total 85 which placed him 7th on the all-time list while Lyon with 73 is now tenth. Besides Reissig and the above, Don Wallens also closed out his football career.

The trophies and letter awards will be given at the annual Father and Son day, Friday, Nov. 19.

## PARK PLAYERS MAKE ALL-CUPS TEAMS

Four soccer players and two football players were named to the ALL-CUPS honor teams according to the announcement made by Kenneth Anthony, athletic director of DeVeaux School and chairman of fall sports.

Co-captains Bob Wilson and Dave Stewart were named to the soccer team at halfback and wing and they were joined by league-leading scorer John Clark, inner, and Joe Bell at fullback. Honorable mention was made to Larry Bodden, Barry Cave, Bob Wilson and Goalie Umerez of DeVeaux were the only repeaters from last year's honor squad.

Dave Lyon and Ron Bell were the two selections from the championship Park football team to be honored. Dick Detrick and John Reissig received honorable mention. Ron Bell emerged as the league-leading scorer with 42 points while Lyon with 25 was in third place. The Park team set a new record as they held the opposition to 58 points.

Friday afternoon will start the annual father and son day activities. After dinner, the Dartmouth alumni will award the baseball trophy and the Yale alumni will make a similar award for football. The German A. C. will present the soccer cup. Letter awards will be made for soccer and football followed by movies of the 1954 football team.

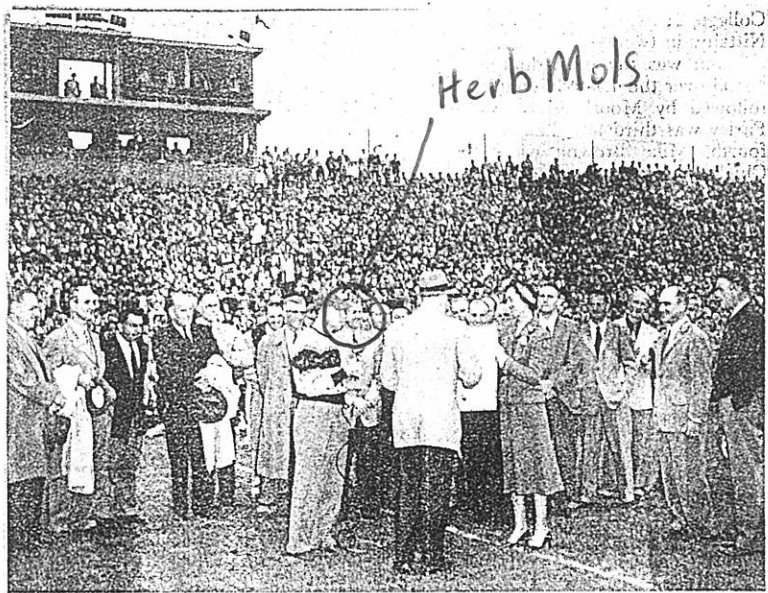
Ray Walters of the Buffalo German A. C. will award the soccer trophy to Co-capt. David Stewart and Robert Wilson.
