

## Park Retains Dartmouth Cup

### Snyder School Baseball Team Has Seven Straight Wins

Completing a CUPS record of seven straight wins, the Park baseball team gained a second leg on the Dartmouth Cup, and its fifth championship in the last six years, by defeating visiting DeVeaux last week, 4 to 0. The season had opened with a one-hitter by Don Lischer and Larry Biggie closed it out in the same fashion, besides retiring 15 via the strikeout route. The Park batters found Pete Kallas equally tough to hit, but made the most of their opportunities. Don Lischer lined a hit into left field, which when it eluded the left fielder, went all the way. Ron Bell singled, stole second, and scored on Dave Colton's sacrifice. In the sixth, Dave Lyon, co-captain and varsity catcher for four years, tripled and scored on a passed ball. Ron Bell lined a double to right and when the throw to third was wild, he scored.

Co-captain Don Lischer and Biggie each had three of the Park wins, Lischer's being his eighth in three years of CUPS play. In addition, he broke the record of triples for a single season by lacing three, while Lyon tied the doubles record with four. Bob Wilson scored 15 runs to break another record, while Lischer had the high batting average of .480 and missed the RHI record of 12 by one.
