

## COLTON'S 3 SCORES PACE PARK SCHOOL

Dave Colton scored three touchdowns and combined with Ron Bauer on a 60-yard pass play for another Saturday as Park School's six-man football team defeated visiting DeVeaux of Niagara Falls, 33-22. It was Park's fourth straight win in the Conference of Upstate Private Schools. Colton returned a fumble 35 yards, raced 40 with a lateral and scored on a 2-yard plunge. Steve Cary ran seven yards and dropkicked two conversions. Don Taylor passed 15 yards to Nat Fairbank and scored on a 35-yard punt return while Bill Ives fell on a Park fumble in the end zone for DeVeaux's scores.

### Soccer Winners

Allendale, which defeated visiting Park, 1-0, Saturday, and Harley School, also of Rochester, are co-champions of CUPS soccer this year. DeVeaux scored its only win of the season, upsetting Harley, 2-1, at Rochester.

## Park School Team Defeats DeVeaux

With Dave Colton scoring three touchdowns and passing to Ron Bauer for a fourth, the Park School six-man football team yesterday defeated visiting DeVeaux, 32-22. Trailing 15-6 at the half, Park rallied for 12 and 14 point outbursts in the third and fourth periods to stay unbeaten in CUPS competition.

Steve Cary accounted for the remaining Park scoring with a 67-yard touchdown run and a two-point PAT dropkick. Don Taylor was the big man for DeVeaux, passing for one TD and an extra point and scoring once himself on a 35-yard run. Bill Ives got the initial DeVeaux six points by falling on a fumble in the Park end zone.

Park, with a 4-3 overall record, has four wins in CUPS competition and is tied with Allendale school, unbeaten in three CUPS contests. The two meet for the league title next Friday at Park.

## Park Gridlers Bow to Allendale

The Park School of Snyder ended its Conference of Upstate Private Schools six-man football competition by dropping a 44-32 decision to visiting Allendale School of Rochester yesterday.

The victory was Allendale's fourth straight and enabled them to take the CUPS title. Park finished second in the conference with a 4-1 record. Park's overall record is 4-4.

Steve Cary scored two touchdowns for Park, on a 50-yard run with a lateral from Dave Colton, and a plunge from the one. He also connected to Colton on touchdown pass plays covering 27 and 58 yards. Ron Bauer plunged over from the two for the other TD, and also plunged for two conversions.

In soccer, Bodden, a senior, is a repeater while Finnell, a junior, is on the team for the first time. DeVeaux's Emory Moje also is a repeater. His teammates, Dean Johnson, Bob St. John and Alan Walker, also are on the first team. Phil Oppenheimer, Park, and Fred Crofts and Dave Roberts, DeVeaux, won honorable mention.

The gale winds and rain squalls of the day before Thanksgiving failed to dampen the cheers of the Park School student body as Miss Brenda Mols, 99 Chateau Ter., president of the Upper school student government, turned over the first spadeful of earth in the ground breaking ceremonies for the two new buildings which will cost \$200,000 and include a science laboratory, art center, auditorium and classrooms. Charles T. Klyn, president of Middle school turned over the second shovelful of earth.

Mason O. Damon, chairman of the school's Board of Trustees and

chairman of the Erie County Library Board dug the third shovelful. Mr. Damon said, "The completion of these buildings for use in Sept. 1957 will end a long felt need in the school." Mr. E. Barton Chapin, Jr., Harlem Rd., headmaster, who dug the last shovelful of earth said that the ground breaking signified a new era in the school's history.
