Park School Quintet Opens Season Tomorrow

Two starters from last year—5-foot-10 inch Tim Finnell and 5-11 Jerry Jacobstein—plus the tallest player in the school's history, 6-4 sophomore Mike Steffans, will carry the burden of the attack as the Park School opens a 15-game season tomorrow at 2 against an alumni team on the Snyder court.

Jacobstein, a junior, was the third highest scorer for last year's entry which tied for second place in the Conference of Upstate Private Schools. Finnell, now a senior, was No. 4 in the scoring parade. Senior Charles Little, 6-1, and Junior Bernis Mandickern, 5-8, are the only other seniors on the 12-man squad. Both were varsity reserves a year ago. Heading the platoon of eight sophomores, along with Steffans, is 5-6 Jim Hollands, the JV scoring leader a year ago. Other highly regarded sophomores are Barry Rogerson, 5-7, and Barry Epstein, 5-2. Rogerson was third in JV scoring a year ago, while Epstein was fourth and Steffans second. Steffans Has Double Duty. Steffans, according to head coach and athletic director Herb Mols, is the key. "He's our only really big man—in fact the biggest we've ever had. With our lack of all-around size he'll have to come through both as a scorer

and a rebounder if we're to finish better than a year ago." Mols also is casting a hopeful eye at the four remaining sophomores—6-foot Larry Burns, Pete Burns, 5-8, Marty Kranitz, 5-11, and Rog Mauze, 5-7. "These boys come through along with Steffans—we might go farther than a tough schedule to be expected."

Park Defeats Alumni, 34-25

Sophomore Jim Hollands and senior Tim Finnell, a pair of hustling guards, paced the Park School varsity basketball team to an opening game 34-25 victory over the Alumni yesterday on the school's home court in Snyder. Hollands pumped 11 points on 4 field goals and 3 free throws, while Finnell connected on 4 goals and 2 charity tosses. Bob Wilson, now a junior at Northwestern, led the Alumni with 10. Park trailed by a point, 8-7, after the first eight minutes but outshot the Alumni, 35-2, in the second period to go ahead to stay.

BUFFALO BOOTER, MAIERHOFER, GETS ALL-STAR MENTION

Howie Maierhofer, Penn State captain-coach, who resides at 812 E. Delaware Ave., received All-America mention for his intercollegiate soccer performances last fall. Maierhofer, a left half, paced Penn State to one of the best soccer records in the country, won't, last fall. The Nittany Lions defeated such soccer powers as Army, Navy, FBI and Maryland. Although left half is primarily a play-making position, Howie scored six goals.

Maierhofer first gained national recognition in 1955 when he was chosen to participate in preliminary trials for the U. S. Olympic soccer team. He then was attending the University of Buffalo, which has no team in that sport. At UB, Howie played freshman basketball. He later transferred to Penn State, where he now is a member in labor management and is in the upper third of his class, academically. The Penn State star started playing local soccer at the age of 8 on a team organized by his father, Edward, who was an outstanding player in Germany in the 1920s.

Howie played in the Buffalo & District League at the age of 12, and in 1952 joined the Buffalo Beeks, now the Simon Puffs. He has played for this team since then. He made the league all-star team while at Park School, where he also played baseball, basketball and track.

Nichols Beats Park, 43-29

Nichols School's basketball team, held to one-field goal in the first half, rattled down the stretch to defeat Park School, 43-29, yesterday on the Nichols court. John Heinrich's basket in the second quarter was the Big Green's only goal in the first 10 minutes. Park led by 11-3 at the quarter and by 19-6 at the half.
