## Park's 32-12 Triumph Gains First Place Tie

Park School forged into a three-way tie for first place in Conference of Upstate Private Schools football competition Friday by whipping Pebble Hill of Syracuse, 32-12. The win was Park's third in five conference games and 4th in six starts this season.

Park's Marc Smith found the range in the opening period tossing a strike to Don McLeod for a touchdown. The play covered 17 yards. The same combination clicked for the extra point.

### Smith Returns Punt 55 Yards

Park busted the game wide open in the second period scoring three times. Peter Barnes scored from one yard out, Smith returned a punt 55 yards for a score and Jim Patten swept left end for 12 yards to give the locals a 25-0 lead at intermission.

Phil Marshall raced 70 yards with a punt return in the third

period to give Park its fifth touchdown of the afternoon. Lester Saft passed to Joe Santoro for the PAT.

Pebble Hill managed a pair of TDs in the final stanza, Mike Sweeney scoring on a 1-yard dive and Phil Young sweeping right end for 30.

Earnes piled up 80 yards in 13 carries and Patten 42 yards in five trips. Neal Stroman, Don Wilson and McLeod stood out on the Park defense.

With the football game tied at 12-all, DeVeaux's John Lunney completed a pass to Don Dick covering 43 yards for the winning TD. Lunney ran for the extra point. Earlier, this same combination tallied DeVeaux's first TD on a 28-yard pass play.

Lunney ran 30 yards to tie at 12. Toby Klyn ran for 30 and 8 yards to get Park off to a 12-0 lead.

## Piepke's 9 Points Lead Park's 11-0 Soccer Win

Walter Piepke scored nine points as the undefeated Park School defeated Lancaster, 11-0, in a non-league soccer game yesterday on the losers' field.

Piepke notched four goals and added a penalty kick. Chip Johnston accounted for the other Park two-pointer. Park's season record is 8-0.

Park School clinched the CUPS championship with its sixth and seventh straight triumphs last week. Curt Siegel collected three goals and Barry Epstein, Walter Piepke, Bryan Meadows, Jeff Meilman, and Chip Johnston one each as Park overpowered Gow School, 16-4. Piepke tallied the winning goal with 30 seconds remaining to give Park a 5-4 win over Harley School of Rochester. Curt Siegel and a penalty kick by Piepke accounted for the other Park scores.

## Park Wins, 19-6; Barnes Scores 3 Touchdowns

Peter Barnes accounted for all the Park School scoring Saturday as the locals hammered out a 19-6 win over Clymer in a non-league game. The victory was Park's fifth in seven starts.

Clymer broke the scoring ice in the first period when Dave Houpt intercepted an errant Park lateral and streaked 37 yards for a touchdown. Park then went to work, with Barnes scoring once in each of the three remaining periods.

### Sheedy Sets Up Score

Barnes's first score came on a 17-yard slant, Mike Sheedy's third-period pass interception set up Barnes's second TD. Effective running by Jim Patten highlighted Park's third touchdown march, capped by Barnes's burst from 1-yard out.

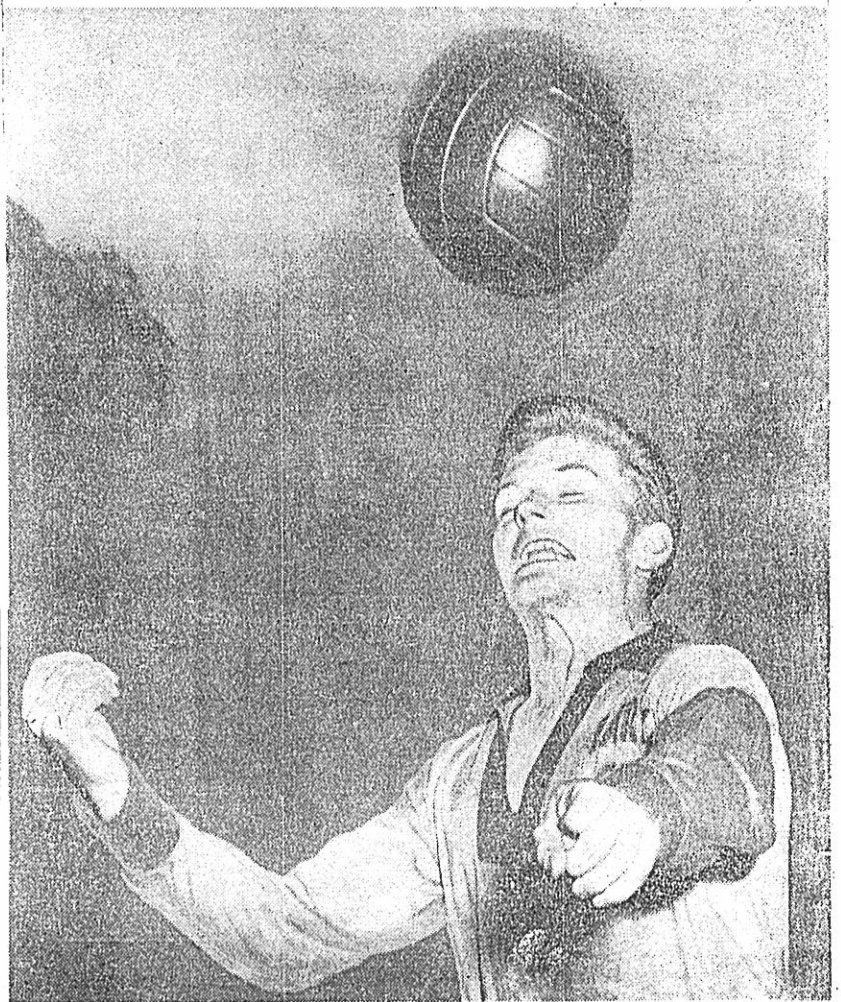
Offensively, Barnes carried 18 times for 52 yards; Patten, six times for 40 yards; and Lester Saft, 10 times for 37 yards. Defensive standouts for the day were Neal Stroman, Sheedy, and Barnes.

Park will meet DeVeaux at home Saturday in a crucial Conference of Upstate Private Schools game that will have a definite bearing on the season championship.

## Switch-Kicker Started at Age 8

IT LOOKS easy when blond, German-born Walt Piepke executes the switch-kick, one of the most difficult maneuvers in soccer.

Piepke, whose 21 points this season sparked Park School's soccer team to an undefeated season and the Conference of Upstate Private Schools title, has the coolness of a veteran, though he is only a 17-year-old junior.

"I started playing soccer at the age of eight in Germany," said Walt, who has perfected split-second timing over the years.

In the switch-kick, Walt

"catches" the ball coming towards his back with his left foot, then flips himself in mid-air and sends it winging backward in the opposite direction with a kick of his powerful right leg.

He also can do the same maneuver with a rolling ball, and his switch-kick goal beat Harley School in Rochester in the last 30 seconds of play.

"He's perfected a feat which only a few Buffalo big-time soccer players duplicated," remarked his coach, Elmer Manspecker, who formerly starred at the State University College of Education at Buffalo.

Piepke, a 5-foot-11-inch 165-pounder who has been in the U. S. two years doesn't limit his work to scoring.

"He's just as good as a playmaker and is a stalwart on defense," Manspecker added.

For the first time this season, Walt didn't score Friday afternoon when Park defeated visiting DeVeaux, 6-2. Bryan Meadows, Mike Dozoretz and Mike Steffan scored the Park goals as the Pioneers registered their sixth straight CUPS victory and their 11th win in a row. Bill Tredennick scored for DeVeaux.

## DEVEAUX CLINCHES TIE FOR GRID TITLE

With John Lunney scoring two touchdowns, DeVeaux School of Niagara Falls Friday afternoon defeated host Park School of Buffalo, 19-12. DeVeaux clinched a tie for the Conference of Upstate Schools six-man football title with Allendale.

DeVeaux and Allendale each have won-4 lost-2 records while Park was third with a 3-3 record. Lunney scored twice in the first half on runs of 28 and 19 yards, while Park tallied on a 35-yard pass play from Pete Barnes to Don McLeod.

Park tied it in the third quarter on Toby Klyn's 25-yard run, but DeVeaux won it in the last two minutes of the game on a 5-yard pass from George Phillips to Brent Davis. Lunney passed to Dan Colley for the extra point.
