

Park Scores 38-37 Win

WEST VALLEY, Sept. 22 — The Park School of Buffalo hit on a 28-yard pass from Gary Mols to Phil Marshall with less than a minute to play to edge West Valley, 38-37, in a non-league game today.

West Valley made an effort to get the lead by running back the kickoff to Park's 15-yard line. Mols ended the threat by intercepting a pass. It was the first game of the season for both schools.

Marshall was in on five of Park's six touchdowns. He threw two scoring passes, caught two others and ran for a TD with an interception. He also heaved two points after touchdowns.

Craig Robinson was the game's only casualty. After going 37 yards for Park's second TD in the second period, he suffered a broken wrist several plays later.

CAPTAIN'S WRIST BROKEN AS PARK EDGES W. VALLEY

WEST VALLEY, Sept. 23—Craig Robinson, captain and only senior on Coach Herb Mols' Park School of Buffalo's six-man football team, will be sidelined indefinitely with a broken wrist.

Robinson ran 17 yards for a touchdown just a few minutes before the mishap. He was treated in Chaffee Hospital, Springville. He was taken to the hospital and missed seeing Park score a 38-37 non-league victory over West Valley as Gary Mols passed 28 yards to Phil Marshall for the winning TD with less than a minute remaining.

Mols also fired a 22-yard TD pass to Marshall, caught a 4-yard TD pass from Marshall. Marshall returned an intercepted pass 30 yards for a TD and passed 5 yards to Jim Derrick for a TD. Doug Frank ran 37 yards for a WV six-pointer and threw 3 TD passes of 11, 17 and 29 yards to Neil Fritz. Fritz ran 32 yards and Jack Hardy 61 for TDs.

Park Teams Score Wins

Park School's football and soccer teams decisioned Pebble Hill School of Syracuse yesterday, the gridders winning, 43-7, and the booters, 6-0. Both games were in the Conference of Upstate Private Schools League.

A drop kick conversion of a touchdown scored eight seconds before the finish gave Allendale School of Rochester a 34-33 triumph over Park School yesterday afternoon.

Bill George, who had a hand in three of Allendale's touchdowns, decided the tight contest with his 10-yard boot, wiping out a 6-point Park School lead in the opening CUPS game for the local school.

Allendale took the lead on a 7-yard pass from Don Conte to George. Peter Goulding passed 32 yards to Mark Dudman for another score. Ted Nitterauer ran three yards and Phil Marshall passed 31 yards to Jim Kreutzer as Park tied the score.

After George passed to Dudman for another Allendale TD, Nitterauer ran 57 yards for another lock. Goldring put the Rochester club in front again with a 1-yard plunge. A Marshall-Kreutzer pass went three yards for a Park score and the same combination worked a pass for the extra point.

Park took a 33-27 lead when Gary Mols completed a 30-yard pass to Marshall. With time running out, George passed to Hap Parker for a yard before George decided the issue with his drop kick.

The Park School soccer team hunted Allendale its first loss in three starts, 4-2. George Cooley scored the winning points with four minutes left. Peter Sukernek's earlier boot had equalized an Allendale score by Terry Porfitt.
