Jim Kreutzer, Park School's record scorer, was a unanimous choice for the ALL-CUPS (Conference of Upstate Private Schools) basketball team for 1961-62, announced today.

Kreutzer netted 203 points for eight conference games, a 25.4 average and a CUPS record. As he led Park to a tie for the championship with Allendale of Rochester.

Craig Robinson, Jim Derrick and Gary Mols of Park and George Phillips of DeVeaux were among those receiving honorable mention.

## Park Skiers Capture Title

Park School of Buffalo, paced by Tom Coleman and John Mayer, yesterday won the annual ski meet of the Conference of Upstate Private Schools. Glenwood Acres played host to the meet because of poor snow conditions at Swain.

Park never had won before in the five years of conference competition. The team victory this year gives Park possession of the Fred Dunn Memorial Trophy, donated by his students in memory of a Park School teacher who helped found the annual meet. Dunn died last year.

Under a complicated system of scoring, Park amassed 1,329 points to 728 for Allendale

School and 723 for Harley School, both of Rochester.

Ten-member teams from each school competed in both downhill and slalom. Park took eight of the first 10 places in the downhill and seven of 10 in the slalom.

Mayer had the fastest single run in the downhill at 39 seconds. Coleman set the pace in the 20-gate slalom at 29.9 seconds.

# Mayer Wins Downhill Event

John Mayer, a Park School student skiing from Kissing Bridge, won the senior men's downhill race yesterday at the Town of Colton's Winter Wonderland Carnival.

Mayer raced down the half-mile "Twist Trail" at Kissing Bridge in 48.8 seconds. Jean Rowley of Glenwood Acres was a close second in 49 seconds and Ted LaCroix of Interstate Ski Club Salamanca, third in 51 seconds.

Red LaFrance of Interstate captured the giant slalom at Glenwood Acres in 34.5 seconds. Thed LaCroix was second in 35 seconds and Jerry Knapp of Glenwood Acres third in 35.5.

Nancy Seimer of Ellicottville Ski Club finished first in the senior women's downhill at Kissing Bridge in 54.3 seconds. Janet Parsons of Glenwood Acres was second in 53 seconds and Sandra Andersen of Interstate third in 62.2.

Another Park School boy, Peter Waterman, took the junior downhill in 49.1 seconds. Ralph Kresge of Buffalo Ski Club was second in 54.1 seconds, and Dick Emke of Holiday Valley third in 54.1.

Miss Anderson, the girls' champion from Interstate, took the senior women's giant slalom, skiing the Glenwood Acres course in 37 seconds. Pepper Montague of

Holiday Valley was runnerup in 38.5 seconds. Janet Parsons of Glenwood and Kathie Gorham of Holiday Valley tied for third in 46 seconds.

Young Waterman also won the junior class giant slalom, qualifying as the best skier under 16 in the meet. Dick Emke was second again in 37 seconds.

and Penny Northrup, a 12-year-old girl representing Ellicottville Ski Club, took third in 29.5 seconds.

Both downhill and giant slalom courses were lightning fast, with three inches of light snow covering the icy slopes.

The senior women and junior slaloms will be raced on a 35-gate course at 11 this morning at Kissing Bridge. Senior men will compete on an Olympic course at Glenwood Acres at 2 this afternoon. An open jumping contest will take place a 3 p.m. on the 30-meter hill at Glenwood.

## A Whole Galaxy of Ski Stars Shines in a Big Day of Racing

Who was the outstanding performer in this year's inaugural Colden Valley Winter Wonderland week-end at the Kissing Bridge and Glenwood area ski resorts?

That would all be in your point of view. Consider, for example, he only three double-event winners in the exciting competition.

1 Nancy Seimer, 17, a lithe, poised Clarence Central School senior representing Ellicottville Ski Club. Nancy, who has been in serious competition for two or three years, scored the most decisive victories. Her triumph in the senior women's slalom was by more than seven seconds; in the downhill, by more than six.

2 Peter Waterman, 15, a varsity football center from the Park School representing Kissing Bridge. Although Peter is just beginning his competitive career, his winning times in the junior downhill and giant slalom were just barely over those turned in by the Senior Division victors.

3 Red France, a husky, 31-year-old telephone company employee from Red House representing the Interstate Ski Club. Red, a veteran of Western New York competitions, turned in the closest two victories, winning the senior men's giant slalom by half a second, and breaking a three-way tie in the slalom in a special ski-off.

Or, consider these individual winners:

senior who plans to study music next year at the State University College at Fredonia, thus limiting a ski career which has seen her turn in many fine competitive efforts. Sondra, who lives within the limits of Allegany State Park and represents Interstate, took the senior women's giant slalom.

4 John Mayer, a teammate of Waterman's on the Park School football team. Only 16 (the minimum for the event) he won the senior men's downhill.
