

## Park Gridmen Clinch CUPS Title

It was for all the marbles for Park when they visited Allendale of Rochester last week in the season's finale. At the start of the day, the CUPS league faced the mathematical possibility of a 4 way tie. But the never-say-die Pioneers took the early lead of 12-0, dissipated this margin to go behind 13-12 and then came through in the final 4 minutes with a 24-13 victory, which gave them a 4-2 CUPS record and the Yale trophy.

Pete Simmons brought the kickoff back to the 38. Two plays later Appel reversed his field for a 35 yard TD run which was nullified by a clipping penalty, apparently after the score. On the next play another penalty set the Pioneers back to the 40, but on 3 straight runs John Sheedy covered the entire distance for an 18-13 lead with 4 1/2 minutes on the clock, Allendale gave it a big try.
