

Park gridgers clinch CUPS tie

The Park soccer team edged a visiting Gow 2-1, Bob Rupp and A.J. Block gave the Pioneers their margin. With this non-league game the record stood at 11 wins, 3 losses and 1 tie.

On a greasy field, Park maintained its CUPS league lead by drubbing Allendale School of Rochester 3-1. As usual, co-captain and league-leading scorer Don Vogel opened the scoring. He was followed in the first period by the AFS student from Brazil, Cesar Menezes, who meshed his first goal of the season.

Tom Ryan scored for Allendale in the second to narrow the margin, only to have Rich Ehrenreich cushion the margin with a 4th period goal. Park now has a 6-1 record with a home match against DeVeaux next Wednesday. They need a win to cash in on the Buffalo Soccer Club trophy outright while Harley of Rochester, with a 5-1-1 record can only await the outcome with an outside hope, while facing traditional rival Allendale next Saturday in its finale. These two games decide the issue of CUPS champion.

At the same time on Friday Park's six-man football team completed a CUPS season of 5 wins and 1 loss to clinch a tie with Pebble Hill School of Syracuse. These two had split the season series. Allendale proved worthy of the muddy gridiron for a whole period which ended scoreless although Park threatened twice, once losing the ball on a fumble at the 3 and another time when a TD pass was called back by penalty.

Shortly after the second quarter started, Dave Mols tossed a short pass to Dick Comeau who lateralled back to Mols for the 35 yard score. Co-captain Dick Appel intercepted the first Allendale pass and returned it 44 yards for the TD. Another Appel TD was called back by penalty but a

Dave Mols to co-captain Comeau covered the final 6 yards for an 18-0 halftime lead.

After receiving a short kickoff Park marched the distance with an Appel-to-Kim-Shoemaker successful pass. Allendale was stopped at midfield and on the first play, sophomore Mark Cox followed excellent blocking for a 39 yard TD. He also took the PAT pass from soph Mols.

Jim Williams tallied Allendale's lone counter on a 7 yard inside reverse to complete third quarter scoring. In the final period Dick Appel just missed on a couple of pass attempts and then decided to run the 40 yards which he accomplished after breaking tackles at the line.

The final score came in the dying moments as Allendale pushed to the 3 only to fumble and have Mols scoop up the loose ball and race the 77 yards to paydirt and a score of 45-6. Appel now has 18 touchdowns for the year which places him third on the all-time season Park achievement.

Park now prepares for an 11 man game at DeVeaux of Niagara Falls Friday, to conclude its season.

Park soccer ties for title, gridmen win

Park's soccer team managed a 2-2 tie with visiting DeVeaux School of Niagara Falls and thereby clinched a title tie. Park had opened with goals by Bob Rupp and Tom Lewin. Playing without co-captain Don Vogel, the Park attack seemed in high gear, even when John Egel scored for the visitors in the second period.

Play in the third period moved somewhat toward the DeVeaux goal but it went unscathed, and a hand ball in the penalty area gave Fred Lyle his chance, and he gave goalie Bob Gilman no chance, at a well-placed corner ball to tie the score.

Double overtime proved to no avail and the score ended with Park's league record 6-1-1 and overall 11 wins, 3 losses and 2 ties. DeVeaux has a won-2, lost-4 and tied-1 in the league.

On Friday, after one week of conversion practice from 6-man to 11-man football, the Pioneers

invaded DeVeaux and emerged a winner 7-3 in a soaked field played in a continuing rainstorm. Taking the opening kickoff, Park marched the length of the field with co-captain Dick Appel going the final 28 yards only to have the run nullified because of a motion penalty, but this maintained a negative record of Appel who has suffered this fate in all but one game this year. DeVeaux took over and their march was culminated in a 25-yard field goal by Jim Logan which gave the Rapideers a 3-0 lead, which held for the first quarter.

In the second quarter, play was restricted within the 40-yard lines and an Appel punt from his own 30 rolled to the 6 where it bounced into a DeVeaux safety and was recovered by Paul Farber. Three plays later Dick Appel raced over from the third and his PAT kick was good after ticking the crossbar. This concluded the scoring for the day with Park the winner 7-3.

Park threatened twice more but a penalty voided a punt return of Pete Simmons' to the DeVeaux 33, and a running into punter cost Park another chance to move. Each team penetrated to the other 25-yard line in the third quarter. In the last quarter, DeVeaux moved to the one for a first down but after four thrusts ended up on the 8.

After moving out to the 30, Jim Nash of DeVeaux returned a punt to the Park 19 and was tackled by Park safety Dave Mols who was the last man to beat. Four plays later the ball was moved back to the 23 and Park took over with 2 minutes left.

Again a penalty stopped a first down play and Park was forced to punt which was partially blocked and went out of bounds on Park's 16. On the second play DeVeaux fumbled and Marc Feuerstein recovered. Two quarterback sneaks were sufficient to run out the clock and the game went to Park 7-3, to end up the season with six straight wins after losing the first two games of the season.

PARK GRIDGERS DEFEAT DEVEAUX IN 11-MAN GAME

NIAGARA FALLS, Nov. 16 — Park School of Snyder Friday closed its football season with a victory that was a little different because it was made by six-man gridgers succeeding in 11-man action.

In brief, the Park gridgers defeated DeVeaux School, 7-3, in 11-man style of football and it wasn't easy.

DeVeaux took a 3-0 first-period lead on a 25-yard field goal by Jim Logan. Park went ahead in the second period on Rich Appel's 3-yard scoring burst and place-kicked for the extra point.

Park then stopped DeVeaux's fourth-period drives to the one and 10-yard lines to complete the season with a won-6 lost-2 record to DeVeaux's 5-2.
