In the CUPS opener at DeVeaux on Friday, Park rallied to come close but not close enough as they lost 58-54. It was DeVeaux's first win since rejoining the league this year. An ankle injury to Dick Ehrenreich in the first 20 seconds forced some revision of team organization while DeVeaux was hot from the field taking a 16-8 lead.

The Pioneers battled back and were down 27-24 at the half with some balanced scoring. Another letdown in the third quarter saw DeVeaux forge to a 45-34 lead at the end of the quarter and with the first couple buckets of the 4th, the Raiders had a 13 point lead.

Park then began its comeback and came within 2 points. A couple lapses, upon which DeVeaux capitalized, put them ahead by six with 2 minutes left, but again foul shots by Mols, Appel and Rochwarger reduced the margin to 3. Scott Skinner's basket offset a rebound by Paul Farber and Skinner's foul shot with 5 seconds left, iced the win.
