

Park Football clinches title

The Park Pioneers made the annual Thruway trek to Pebble Hill School in Syracuse a winning one as they clinched the CUPS title with a convincing 46-20 triumph. A year ago these two teams had tied. This year Park holds a 5 and 0 record with the final game listed for Allendale at Rochester next Friday while its nearest rivals have suffered two defeats. Park will gain a second leg on the Yale Trophy.

The opening kickoff was returned by Park all the way with Dave Mols plunging the final 14. Don Pulli caught the PAT pass from Duane Sevillian. After an exchange of fumbles, Park again tallied as Mols went the final 16 and the same Sevillian to Pulli made the PAT.

In the second period Mols tired a 29 scoring pass to Sevillian in the end zone. The entire Park squad made the scene and Pebble Hill was able to score on an errant lateral picked off by Tom Harris who rambled 40 yards. Jon Lichtman ran the PAT and the half ended 20-7.

Pebble Hill was unable to move with the second half kickoff and after taking over, Sevillian threw to Mols for a 46 yard TD play and the score was the only points in the third. In the final period Sevillian streaked for a Mols aerial and 55 yards for the TD and shortly afterwards raced around end for 47 yards after a key block by Cox. The final Park TD came following a 55 yard run by Mols when he was tripped up on the

one, but plunged over on the next play. Jim Moore plunged one yard and Peter Heilig caught a 13 yard TD pass from Craig Schultz for the Pebble Hill scores. The Syracuse team controlled the ball for 50 runs and 16 pass attempts against a total of 26 plays for Park but they were unable to cross the most important line. Mols led his runners with 89 yards on seven carries as the team totalled 180 and he completed 4 of 7 passes for 105 yards. Center and co-captain Don Pulli led the defense with 8½ tackles.

PARK SOCCER WINS TWICE

Park downed visiting Calasactius 5-0 in soccer. This was the sixth win for the Snyder team against 3 losses and 1 tie. Mike Lewin opened the scoring in the first period followed by goals by John Lipsitz and Brian Rowe in the second. In the fourth period Lipsitz again tallied while co-captain Gordie Ross completed the days scoring. Senior Steve Greene and freshman Roger Hedstrom shared the shutout.

Friday's trip to Syracuse resulted in a 3-1 win for the Pioneers and made their CUPS record five wins and a tie with but two games to go. Mike Lewin again broke the ice in the first period while Bernd Zimmerman added one each in the first and second stanzas. Ken Jasper averted the shutout for Pebble Hill against Steve Greene. Next Friday Park travels to Allendale where the season's standings will be resolved for unbeaten Park and once-beaten Allendale.

Park Nears Two Titles

Park School of Snyder edged closer to Conference of Upstate Private Schools titles in football and soccer by defeating Harley School of Rochester.

Park's soccer team posted a 2-1 triumph on Gord Ross' goal in the first overtime. Bernd Zimmerman had the first Park goal. Park leads CUPS soccer play with a 4-0-1 record.

The Snyder school clinched at least a tie for the football crown with a 53-33 triumph. Park can clinch it with a win at Pebble Hill of Syracuse Friday. They tied for the 1968 title.

alternated runs with Duane scoring from the 5 to again take the lead as Mols dropkicked for 2 more points. With seconds left in the half, Hatch to Torrey again cleared the secondary and Limestone had a 28-26 deficit at halftime.

With the first half all offensive, the second half was reversed. Each team had several cracks at the ball but none could mount a drive and late in the 3rd, Ray Hatch alertly grabbed a flat pass and raced in untouched from 32 yards out with what proved to be the clinching score.

After Park stopped a drive at its one yard line, they gathered some momentum on passes by Mols to Rochwarger and Sevillian but the drive stalled at the 25. This time Limestone garnered the contest by a Mike Higgins 21 yard run and Ray Hatch ran the PAT for the final of 39 points. Park's runners were led by Mols with 162 yards and Sevillian with 126 while Hatch with 115 and Higgins with 135 topped Limestone.

DE WITT, Oct. 25 — Dave Mols and Duane Sevillian, rotating as quarterback and wingback, combined for seven touchdowns Friday leading Park School of Snyder to another Conference of Upstate Private Schools' six-man football championship with a 46-20 victory over Pebble Hill.

Mols scored on runs of 14, 16 and 1 yards and a 46-yard pass from Sevillian. Sevillian scored on 29 and 55-yard passes from Mols and a 47-yard run. Don Pulli ran for three extra points.

In soccer Park boosted its CUPS record to won-5 lost-0 tied-1 with two games remaining by defeating Pebble Hill, 3-1. Bernd Zimmerman scored twice and Mike Lewin once for the pioneers.

Park's Football Ready to Change

THIS IS A WEEK of transition for the Park School football squad.

Numerically speaking it is moving up.

Moving up, that is, from six-man football, sometimes referred to as economy-sized football, to the 11-man style.

Cause for the transition is Park's game with undefeated DeVeaux on the Niagara Falls school's field Saturday.

DeVeaux is exclusively an 11-man football school. Park apparently likes to flex muscles of versatility.

PARK COACH HERB MOLLS was asked if his squad was encountering any problems in the transition. "Some minor problems, of course," he said. "No major problems, though."

"After all, football is basically a blocking and tackling game whether it is six-man football or 11-man football. The techniques differ somewhat, of course. But the fundamentals remain just about the same."

One of the technique differences lies in pass receiving. "In six-man football, everybody is eligible to receive a pass," Mols explains. "In the 11-man game, there are restrictions regarding eligible receivers."

"Generally speaking, six-man football's 'open door' policy on pass receiving helps make for a higher scoring game than 11-man football. The fact that our six-man field is a little smaller than the standard field contributes to the scoring, also."

THE SCORE OF PARK'S final game of the six-man season in which it won the Conference of Upstate Private Schools' championship for the third consecutive year, substantiates Mols' high scoring theory. In that game Park defeated Allendale of Rochester, 52-45.

This was Park School's 11th championship season since 1947 under Mols' coaching. Herb took over the position in 1946. The conference, by the way, was Mols' idea. It has grown into one of the finest leagues of its type in the country.

Mols believes that the six-man football techniques "put a little more pressure on the boys than the standard game. It's a more wide open game than the standard game, and the boys have little more space to cover individually. They can't be 'hiding out' at the guard and tackle positions."

Mols also notes that "speed and agility are emphasized over power in the six-man game. But basically it all boils down to blocking and tackling."

THE QUESTION as to whether six-man football could prepare a lad for the college branch of the game, or even the pro branch, came up. "History is that our conference lads have no difficulty at all making the move from the six-man to the 11," Mols says,

For a school such as Park, six-man football is a necessity. It just doesn't have the male enrollment necessary for a standard size program.

By the way, if there was ever a novice football coach, it was Mols when he took over

at Park. "I'd never seen a six-man football game up to that time," he recalls.
