

# Park fourth in CUPS track in CUPS track

On Saturday, the 24th annual Conference of Upstate Private Schools (CUPS) Track & Field Championships were held in Rochester and DeVeaux School succeeded Park as winners in the combined Senior-Junior Division. Park also relinquished title to the Midget diadem to Pebble Hill School of Syracuse and in the Cubs division to host Harley School. A drizzle in the morning may have contributed to the lack of records in the older divisions as only one record in the Junior division by Bill Minnett in the hurdles came in the P.M. Park managed 4 individual wins in the Seniors and none in the Juniors led by 11th grader Duane Sevilian who won the 100, 220 was edged in the high jump by the least misses rule, and anchored the winning relay team. Brian Rowe won the low hurdles and was also on this team along with Duncan Clarke who had a 2nd and 3rd and with Dave Mols who had a second in the 880 and 3rd in the low hurdles.

The Park School of Buffalo was defending champion in the junior-senior as well as the midget division. The midget crown went to Pebble Hill with 41 points to Park's 38.

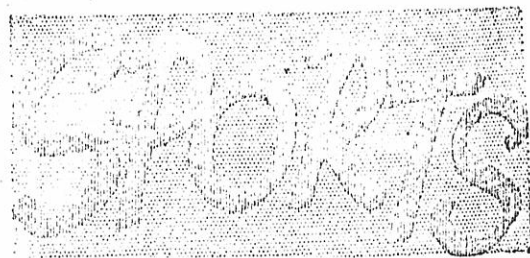

## AAU Picks Young Basketball Team



YOUTH WAS SERVED in the formation of the National AAU basketball team which will embark Wednesday on a European tour.

There was some long term planning involved, too.

Buffalonian Herbert J. Mols will manage the squad that will make stops in Russia, Poland and Poland.

Charley Bailey, youth chairman of the National AAU basketball committee and secretary of the Niagara District AAU, chose Monday that the squad consists of one above collegian sophomore caliber.

The squad has completed two Park School tests, and includes 14 players, seven sophomores and one collegian from the district. "I've got a lot of talent in the area," he said. "All have the potential to play at the college level."

The players are the survivors of a 170-man squad which recently completed three weeks of preparation at the United States Olympic Basketball Committee Development Camp at the Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs.

"The original squad," Mols said, "was acquired through recommendations by AAU officials, NCAA officials and Armed Forces officials. It had representation from high school, junior college, four year college level, as well as the service ranks. It was a truly representative group and a talented one, too."

MOLS, ONE OF THE management crew at the camp, said the AAU has been "doing some long term planning in this youth movement angle. The committee was looking beyond this trip to the Olympic games two years from now, and to the Pan-American games also."

"The committee decided it would be wise to fashion a young squad now and attempt to keep it intact for the Olympics and the Pan-Am games. So college juniors were bypassed although they of course could have strengthened this team."

The remaining is faced with the task. If this team can be kept intact, or at least reasonably intact, and coached as a unit whenever possible, it should develop into a formidable Olympic squad.

The camp was a genuine basketball assembly. The squad was divided into four teams, and two daily workouts which included of course actual games, and one study blackboard talk. International rules under which the team will play were also covered.

"It was just a case of playing basketball, practicing basketball, talking basketball, and eating and sleeping. The kids loved it, though, and there was nary a complaint."

TWO OF THE COACHES who participated in the camp have played roles in the Canisius College Memorial Auditorium doubleheader program. They are Henry Iba and Johnny Bach. Iba brought many great Oklahoma teams here in the early days of the CC program. Bach, now Penn State coach, brought good Fordham teams here for games with the Griffins.

Another of the camp coaches with a reputation was Ed Pedgen of Wilkes University. Coach Pedgen is a former basketball player for the Philadelphia Athletics who (reportedly) was the coach of the team that won the 1954 World Series. He has coached at Wilkes for many years and is a well-respected coach in the area.
