Park grididders win Yale trophy

Park School completed an undefeated season by downing a tough Allendale School of Rochester six 24-6. Park is now 6 and 0 for the season and marks the 7th undefeated season for Coach Herb Mols since 1946. It was the tenth undefeated CUPS record and the 12th Yale Trophy victory in 25 years for the Pioneers.

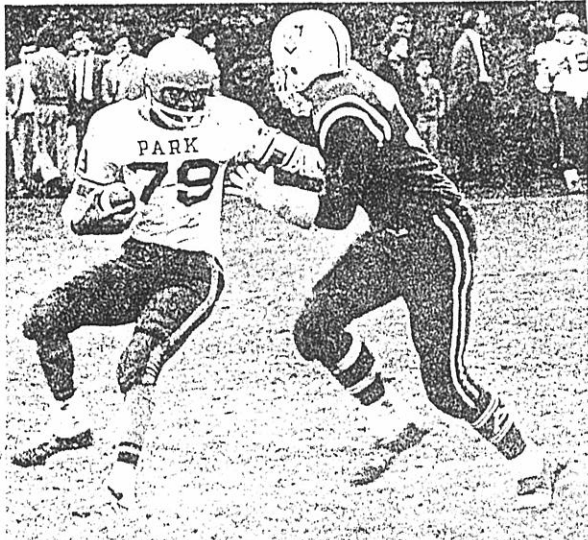
A supercharged Allendale team took the early initiative and after both teams punted twice, they marched in from midfield with co-captain Jim Williams plunging from the two. On the next kickoff, Dave Mols completed 2 of 3 passes to Duane Sevillian and Bob Colvin and then raced around end from the 30 to tie the contest. This came in the second period. After this kickoff, Allendale marched to midfield before a fumble was recovered by Mark Cox for Park at the 32. The Pioneers stuck to the ground and from the 16 Duane Sevillian swept end but fumbled only to have Mols sweep up the errant ball and reverse the field behind good blocks to score again.

After intermission, it appeared that Allendale was again inspired to upset and aided by a couple of penalties they forced Park gradually back to their own 22. Completed passes from Mols to Cox, then to Rochwarger and then Cox to Mols put the ball at the 13 and Mols circled end behind Cox' key block and shook off another tackler to go in for the third time. Just prior to the end of the 3rd, Mols tossed a screen to Cox who went 42 yards following blocks by Bob Colvin and Rochwarger but he was hauled down from behind by Hillery.

Park was held for downs and the Rochesterians again marched deep to Park's 17 where the drive ended. On the first play, Mols teamed with his favorite streak-receiver Sevillian for 63 yards and the final CUPS TD for the swift flanker. Park had retained its CUPS championship for the 4th straight year and members of all those 4 squads were tri-captain Dave Mols, Gary Allen and Mark Cox. Joining them as sophomores and also completing their careers were the other tri-captains Jeff Rochwarger and Duane Sevillian. 4 straight championships ties the CUPS record set by the Park teams of 1948-51.

PARK TIES FOR FIRST

On Friday, Allendale of Rochester visited Snyder, as the league leaders in soccer. After absorbing a 3-1 defeat, they were still on top but now they had to share the rung with Park. Charles Leshner jumped Park off to the front with a goal from inside at 9:20 of the first period. Mike Norris tied the game for the visitors in the second. In the 3rd and 4th periods Bernd Zimmerman cashed tallies to ice the victory for the Snyder school. Yercaris in goal had 13 saves to 8 for Allendale. The score reversed an earlier loss at Rochester. Park soccer clinches tie for crown

On Friday, the Park soccer team coached by John Karrer eclipsed DeVeaux School of Niagara Falls 4-0 and thereby gained at least a tie for the Buffalo Soccer Club trophy. Park has a 4-2 record while the two Rochester schools play off Sat. with Allendale retaining a chance to tie providing they win this finale. Park shared the title in '66, '67 and '68 while winning outright last year. Thus the Pioneers have 2 legs on this edition of the CUPS league trophy.

Freshman Gary Vogel opened the scoring on a muddy field with 2 quick goals at 10 minutes and 12:05 of the first period. Bernd Zimmerman scored on a penalty kick in the second stanza and frosh Chip Larkin closed the scoring at 13 minutes of the final quarter to gain the win. Park's overall record is 7 wins, 2 ties and 2 losses.

The second tie of the season came last Tuesday when Park visited Neumann and ended up 1-1. Mark Karrer tallied at 5 minutes of the first quarter only to have Uzombo connect with the equalizer in the third quarter.

PARK EDGED BY DEVEAUX

Park School visited DeVeaux School of Niagara Falls on Saturday after switching to 11 man football for a week and nearly pulled off a win but failed by a 20-12 score. Park took the opening kickoff across midfield and then tried twice before Dave Mols combined with Jeff Rochwarger on a 19 yard touchdown pass score. In the next quarter Park twice fumbled and lost the ball and finally the Rapideers took advantage and marched from their 49 with a 3 yard plunge by quarterback Gary Williams tying the count.

Mols' 308 Yards Pace Park's 4th CUPS Grid Title

Dave Mols' 308 yards individual offense total Friday led Park School's fourth straight Conference of Upstate Private Schools six-man football championship.

The Pioneers defeated visiting Allendale of Rochester, 24-6, for their 12th crown in 25 years. Mols, who scored on runs of 30, 16 and 13 yards, carried 14 times for 88 yards. He passed 63 yards to Duane Sevillian for a score, completing 15-of-24 passes for 220.

In soccer, Park tied for the CUPS lead, boosting its record to won-3 lost-2 with a 3-1 victory over Allendale as Bernd Zimmerman scored twice and Charles Leshner once.

Mols' 285 Grid Points Breaks Brother's Record

ROCHESTER, Oct. 17 — Dave Mols broke his brother Gary's scoring record Friday, as he led Park to a 45-20 Conference of Upstate Private Schools six-man football victory over Harley. Mols scored on 33 and 1-yard runs and a 47-yard pass from Duane Sevillian giving him a career total of 285 points, breaking the record of 267 set by Gary in 1963. Sevillian scored twice, on a 59-yard reverse and a 66-yard interception as Park boosted its record to won-5 lost-0.

In soccer, Pete Whitbeck's penalty kick gave Harley a 1-0 victory.

Twice more in the fourth period Park moved into deep DeVeaux territory but twice penalties frustrated the drives. The margin of victory showed in the ground game of DeVeaux as they ran 30 plays for 236 yards while managing only 10 via the pass route. Mols ran 7 plays for 55 yards ably assisted by Mark Cox who ran 16 for 51 yards. Mols completed 11 of 21 passes for 114 yards. Cox and Mols led the tacklers from their linebacker slots.

6 Park athletes on CUPS team

Three Park School football players and 3 soccer players achieved ALL-CUPS (Conference of Upstate Private Schools) mention this past year in the list released by Fall Sports Chairman Earl Mitchell of DeVeaux School. The voting is conducted by both the players, who nominate opponents only, and by the coaches.

Tri-captains David Mols and Duane Sevillian repeated being named to the football squad and were joined by fullback Mark Cox. Allendale players were Jim Williams and Jack Rugaber while Harley furnished Rick Peck. Honorable mention was accorded Park's other tri-captain, Jeff Rochwarger.

Statistics were also released which confirmed that Park had won the Yale Alumni trophy for the 4th straight year. This edition of the cup is thereby retired and joins 3 others which have been retired in the 24 years of CUPS play, all under Coach Herb Mols. His teams have won 12 championships in the 24 years of competition. Dave Mols repeated as league high scorer with 74 points in 4 games as well as 5 TD passes thrown. Sevillian was third with 36 points. Mols set the league record of 134 points and 20 touchdowns a year ago. Dave also ended his 4 years with a Park career scoring total of 309 points and 46 touchdowns as well as 34 touchdown passes completed.

In soccer, inside Bernd Zimmerman and halfback Kent Jewett repeated on the first team. Zimmerman was again the league high scorer with 5 goals. Soph goalie Pete Yercaris had 3 shutouts and allowed but one goal in the other 3 contests and received the selection also. Honorable mention went to senior Tim Cochrane, junior Tim Fitzgerald, soph Mark Karrer and freshmen Chip Larkin and Gary Vogel, who were the No. 2 and No. 3 scorers. Overall Park won 7, tied 4 and lost but the 2 games in league play. The soccer team has gained two legs on the Buffalo Soccer Club trophy.
