powerhouse in competition for
the Dr. Bapst Tennis trophy.

However, there is at least one
staunch holdout against this
trend in area scholastic sports,
That is the Park School in
Snyder. There, the girls have

their organized leagues, the boys have theirs, and never the twain shall meet.

AT LEAST, THAT IS the current attitude of the school's athletic director, Herb Mols. Herb's daughter, by the way, is coach of the girls' spring track team, and the girls' soccer team in the fall.

"We feel obligated to build comprehensive programs for both the boys and the girls," Mols said recently on a day typical of campus activity. Typical because many branches of sports were being indulged in.

"We see no need and no reason for moving the girls into

the previously all-male sports. The girls have plenty of com-petition in their activities, and the boys likewise in theirs."

A spot check of some of the young ladies busy in track and field and softball that day revealed no strong feelings for or against the school's attitude.

TYPICAL OF THE COM-MENTS on the situation was one from Cheryl Meyer, an 11th grade student who resides at 419 Burroughs Dr., Snyder. Miss Meyer plays on the soft-ball team, is a sprinter and lurdler on the track team, and is active also in figure skating.

"Oh, it might be fun to be on
a boys' team," she said. "But to
me that is not too important,
Besides, I don't faney the idea
of a girl possibly beating out a
boy for a place on his team
when the girl has a team of her
own to play on."

Ca'hy Pearce, a 12th grader, allowed that girls playing on heretofore all-boys' te ams would be all right, I guess. I don't think it would present too much of a problem. But the need fer such integration is not as necessary at Park as it might be in public schools that don't have such extensive programs for girls."

MISS PEARCE, INCIDENTALLY, will matriculate to Vermont College next fall where she will major in liberal arts. And why did she choose Vermont Cellege?

"Well, it is a fine school academically, to start with" she

"Well, it is a fine school academically, to start with," she said. "It's more or less in the country, and I like the country, And I was attracted also by its fine sports program." Vermont is an all-girl school, but is soon to go co-educational.

Versatility seems to be a way
