Mark Karrer again opened the scoring at 3:36 of the opening period followed by a penalty kick conversion by Rog Hedstrom at 6:33. At 12:20 of the same period Tom Siebert tallied for the visitors. In the second period Dave More scored from in close and the final goal came at 13 of the 3rd by Jim Randall. Both goalies stopped everything in the final stanza.

Last Monday Park played host to Campus School and won this non-league 2-1. Mark Karrer scored from outside the penalty area followed by Lin Hengerers drive from the wing in the second. Late in the 4th Kevin Kiehl spoiled sub goalie Kurt Holme's bid for a shutout.

Park kicked off and halted the visitors first drive and after receiving the punt drove to midfield where they also were forced to punt. Allendale stalled until a pass was intercepted by Marty Cohn. 4 plays later senior quarterback Pat Sayres raced in from the 5 and passed to Ivan Lockett for the PAT. The Rochester team took the next kickoff and marched to the 4 before being stopped. On the first play Sayres tossed a screen pass to Lockett who went the 64 yards behind perfect blocking. Co-captain Marty Downey took pat pass from Sayres. This ended the first half scoring.

The second half kickoff was carried back by Sayres to the 36. The sustained drive was culminated with a 7 yard plunge by Marty Cohn and Sayres clicked again with pat. Allendale was again stopped and Park marched from its 17 with a Sayres to Lockett pass good for 28 yards and the TD. In the final period, Sayres unleashed a bomb to Downey which covered 37 yards and the final score for Park. Just prior, Allendale has escaped its shutout when Dick Birch went 2 for a score and Monty Hillery ran for the pat. Park ran for 174 yards and passed for 161 more in its balanced attack. Lint Hengerer opened the scoring at the 5 minute mark followed by Mark Karrer from the other inside spot at 7 minutes. Back for his first game this year, Gary Vogel drilled one at 10 minute spot and Lee Klopfer topped off the scoring at 12 minutes to lead 4-0 at halftime.

ROCHESTER — Ivan Lockett and Marty Cohn scored three touchdowns each Friday as Park School opened its bid for a fourth straight Conference of Upstate Private Schools football title by ripping host Harley School, 62-13.

Lockett cashed on a 36-yard run, a 42-yard pass from Pat Sayres and a 66-yard kickoff return, while Cohn plunged across from two and three yards out before tallying on a 64-yard pass from Jim Austin.

Park, beginning its 27th season under Coach Herb Mols, also had two touchdowns from Marty Downey on 10 and 32-yard runs, plus a three-yard scoring dive by Bob Colvin.

Harley scored in the second quarter on Sam Abram's 39-yard run and in the third period on Rick Schwartz' 32-yard pass to Bob Hallenbeck.

The two schools' soccer teams opened their CUPS schedule also and battled to a 1-1 tie. Chip Larkin put Park in front briefly with a fourth-period goal, but Harley's Chris Sayre later matched it.

Rich Williams went 27 for Harley to close out the scoring with Park the winner 40-12. Park is now 3 and 0 with the finale set for Allendale next Saturday.

"THIS ENABLES the dribbler to watch the opposition, not the ball, and this greatly reduces the injury element. We teach them how to fall properly, too, when bumped, and this also reduces the injury threat."

Any noticeable difference between soccer as played by the

males and the females? "Well," the coach said, "I think we stress position play a little more than the males, and I think we work more on developing individual skills than the males."

Admittedly, soccer is a rough sport, physically demanding. What prompts young ladies to go in for it when less demanding sports are available.

"IT HAS BEEN my experience the girls who go in for soccer or field hockey, another rough sport, thoroughly enjoy the physical activity provided by these sports," Miss Mols said. "They seem to realize, also, the importance of having a physical outlet."
