

Swimming Meet At Park School This Evening

When all of the swim trials are over tonight, each of the events will be reduced to the best four finalists in all classes. Besides the published 19 boys' and 11 girls' events, a new Peewee Class has been established this week. The midget class, heretofore all those under 13, attracted enough entries to warrant splitting the groups. As part of an experiment, the boys and girls ten and under will have their own 20-yard free-style races.

Fifteen events, some with three and four heats each, will be necessary to run off tonight in order to reduce the field. Tomorrow night at 6:00 P. M., the finals will be held for all classes. The third annual Town championships are again being held at the Park School outdoor pool and are open to the public.

Junior Olympic swim championships at Kensington pool were postponed until this Saturday, August 20. Any of the Town swimming team who cannot make this meet should please contact Mr. Mols, Circle 1651, immediately.

Two Sets of Brothers In Park School Swim

Two sets of brothers will be competing in this evening's Town of Tonawanda vs. Town of Amherst swim meet in the Park School outdoor pool. They are Kerry and Tim O'Hara and John and Bill Penn of the Town of Tonawanda. Kerry will oppose Gary Mols in the peewee 20-yard freestyle while Tim will swim the midget 20-yard breaststroke. Bill Penn will swim the midget 20-yard backstroke and John is entered in the 13-14-year division 40-yard backstroke.

Girls' Relay Teams Break Two Records

The Amherst-Williamsville team placed third at the Junior Olympic Swimming Meet in the Kensington pool last Saturday, losing the trophy to Kensington.

Boys on the team won 13 points, girls won 23 for a total of 36. Weakness in older boys events cost Amherst the title, some observers believe.

Nevertheless, the Amherst-Williamsville contingent had two record-breaking relay teams in the 11-12 year and 15-16 year girls' divisions.

In boys' events for those 10 years and under, the Amherst teams placed third in the 100 yard free style relay.

DEAD-HEAT FINISH IN BREASTSTROKE HIGHLIGHTS SWIM

A dead heat between Amherst's Jerry Worden and Tonawanda's Pat Flynn in the intermediate girls' 40-yard breaststroke event Wednesday evening highlighted the Town of Tonawanda's 174-101 swim meet victory over the Town of Amherst in the Park School outdoor pool.

Present and former members of the Kenmore High School swimming team swept first place in every event of the unlimited boys' division. Ev Smethurst took two events, winning the 100 free in 1:00 and the 160-yard individual medley in 2:02.8. The winners follow:

Y Swimmers Accept Amherst 'Stars Challenge

The Jamestown YMCA swimming team has been invited to compete in a dual meet against an All-Star team from Amherst at 2 P.M. Saturday afternoon at Amherst's Park School outdoor pool, it was announced Tuesday night by local Y officials.

The Amherst 'Stars were selected following the annual Town of Amherst swimming championships held at the Park School last week, and meet director Herbert Nels has invited the Jimtowners to swim against the first and second-place winners in each of the events held in this year's annual meet.

Dick Bower, local association physical director, stated that the invitation has been accepted, even though the local squad will be at best only half-strength due to the current vacation season.

On Saturday, Sept. 3, the local Y will sponsor their Third Annual Conquer Lake Chautauqua Swimming Event, to be held at Midway Park beach beginning at 2 P. M.

This annual challenge to those local swimmers who feel they can maneuver the mile and a quarter of Chautauqua's waters, is open to all area swimmers with a certificate in the offering for those successful aquatics and a gold "Oscar" for the first to reach shore.

Each entrant must be accompanied by a boat. If any entrant cannot furnish his own boat, this should be designated on his entry blank and one will be provided for a small fee.

In the 13-14 class, Ruth Jonathan took fourth in the 50 yard free style.

In the same class, Ann Marcille won third in the 100 yard breaststroke.

In the division of girls 15-16, Amherst's team won the 200 yard free style and set a new meet record. The team members were: Mary Stonecliffe, Barbara Eno, Brenda Mols and Geraldine Worden. The time was 2:38.8.

Sets U. S. Record In Swimming Race



LINDA BROWN, 12, blonde daughter of Ken Brown, 1939 Cornell football captain, Saturday set a national AAU swimming record of 29.7 seconds in the 40-yard backstroke. Linda, who lives in Mayville, lowered the record for girls 12 in Park School's outdoor pool.

Linda Brown, 12, Sets AAU Swim Record

Linda Brown, 12, of Jamestown, shattered a National AAU age-group swimming record for the 40-yard breaststroke yesterday as the City of Jamestown swimmers defeated the host Town of Amherst champs, 186-72.

Linda swam the distance in 29.7 seconds to clip 1.3 seconds off the former National AAU record for girls 12 years old and under.

A triple victory by another Jamestown swimmer, Bill Radack, also highlighted the meet.

Radack, who last year while at Jamestown High was named an All-American schoolboy backstroker by the High School Coaches' Association, won the 40 freestyle in :20.1, the 100' back in 1:05.3, and the 100 free in :59.5.

Kevin Wilson and Geraldine Worden won individual events for Amherst. Wilson won the individual 160-yard medley in 2:00.8. Miss Worden won the breaststroke for intermediate girls with a clocking of :30.

Amherst teams won two relays: Karen Leffler, Beverly Dumke, Mary Postoloff and Janice Harvey combined to take the 80-yard freestyle relay for girls 10 and under. Time was 1:19.4.

Bob Sachs, Ed Castine, Dave Cullis and Jerry Mols won the same event for boys 10 and under in :59.5.
